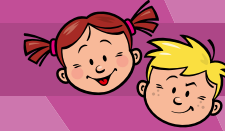
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Welcome to Vienna!



The Hotel Sacher is where the legendary "Sachertorte", a chocolate cake made with apricot marmalade, was invented. Absolutely delicious!

Great, we're in Vienna! Vienna is the biggest city in Austria: 1.7 million people live here, as well as around 53,000 dogs. It also has more than 1,700 bridges - that's four times as many as Venice has! Around 2.4 million people - more than a quarter of Austria's entire population - live in Vienna and the surrounding area. Vienna is also the capital of Austria and at the same time one of its nine states, known in German as "Länder". The city's coat of arms is a red shield with a white cross.

Vienna has more than 600 public playgrounds, including a few water playgrounds. In fact Europe's biggest water playground, the "Wasserturm" (Water Tower), is right here in Vienna. Spread across an area of 15,000 m², you can splash around and spray water around to your heart's content here!

At the heart of Vienna is St. Stephen's Cathedral, which stands on St. Stephen's Square. If you climb the 343 steps to the top of the 136-meter-tall South Tower you'll have a fantastic view of the city! Vienna was the royal seat of the Habsburg emperors. You've probably heard of Sissi and Franz, or in other words Franz Joseph I of Austria and his wife Elisabeth.



The Wiener Prater is made up of the Wurstelprater, an amusement park with a huge Ferris wheel, and the "Grüner Prater", a park covering an area of six million square meters.

Well you're in luck because Vienna has 700 drinking fountains.



On the left side of the main entrance to St. Stephen's Cathedral you'll find the "Tuch- und Leinelle", two metal yardsticks sunk into the wall that were used for measuring goods in the old days.
