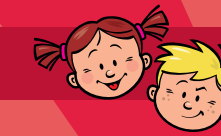

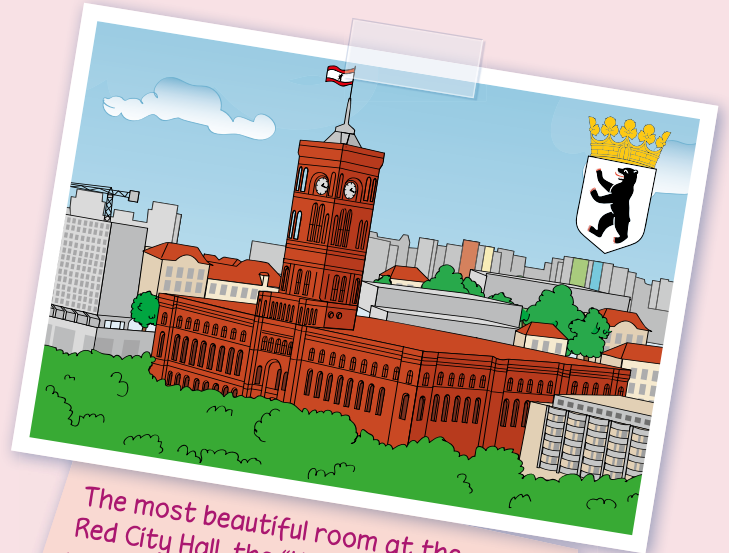

Welcome to Berlin!

Great, we're in Berlin! Berlin is the biggest city in Germany: almost 3.5 million people live here, as well as around 100,000 dogs. There are also more than 170 museums and over 1,800 playgrounds!

Berlin is the capital of Germany. This is where the German government, the Federal Chancellery and the German parliament are based. The Senate of Berlin and the Mayor of Berlin work at Berlin's city hall, called the "Red City Hall", which is very close to Alexanderplatz, the big square where the Berlin TV Tower stands.



The most beautiful room at the Red City Hall, the "Hall of Pillars", is often used for exhibitions.



The German Chancellor works at the Federal Chancellery. Many Berliners call it the "washing machine". Can you see why?

One of the city's most famous landmarks is the Brandenburg Gate. It's more than 200 years old. On top of it you can see the Quadriga, a chariot drawn by four horses driven by Irene, the Greek goddess of peace. Brandenburg Gate used to symbolize Germany's division into East and West Germany, but today it stands for German unity.

A teddy bear as Berlin's symbol? That's for babies!
