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


Welcome to Munich!

Great, we're in Munich! Munich is the third-largest city in Germany. More than 1.3 million people live here, plus around 27,000 dogs. There are also over a thousand beer gardens and almost seven hundred public playgrounds!

Munich is a city that loves old traditions. You often see people here wearing the traditional Bavarian costume: women in dirndls (like the one Lilly is wearing below) and men in lederhosen (short leather pants - see Anton). The kids wear exactly the same costumes as the adults - just smaller. For more than 200 years, fresh food has been sold daily at the Vitualienmarkt, a market in the center of Munich. There's bound to be something for a gourmet like you here, too!

When a foehn wind is blowing you can see the Alps behind the Frauenkirche. None of the buildings in the city center is allowed to be higher than the church's towers.



The facade of the New Town Hall features the largest glockenspiel in Germany, with 43 bells and 29 mobile figures.

Munich's largest church, the Cathedral of our Dear Lady known as the "Frauenkirche" - is Munich's main hallmark. At the entrance you can see the Teufelstritt or "Devil's Footstep", which according to local legend is a footprint left by the devil!





You'll see the coat of arms of the city of Munich, called the "Münchner Kindl", everywhere: on trams, manhole covers, etc. What's your favorite place for it?
