



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Introduction

You can choose from many ways to manage your home finances. One way is to take a sheet of paper, write down all your income, take note of your expenditure, and then compare the difference between the two to see whether you're down or up at the end of the month. The other option is to buy a personal accounting package that's dedicated to the task.

Unlike Quicken or Microsoft Money, Home Accountz (published by Accountz.com Limited) is developed within the U.K. and is supported by PCs running Windows or Linux, or Mac OS X computers. If you have a technical query, the company has a lively forum available at www.accountz.com, where you'll quickly get assistance to resolve all major issues; and if you have a query about whether it will meet your needs, you can always telephone and ask. You'll get an honest answer, too.

About This Book

Home Accountz For Dummies addresses each of the different sections within Home Accountz and illustrates how you can use the program to meet your personal financial-management needs. The chapters have been logically divided up; you can dig into the book at any point if you want to better understand only certain parts of the package — there's no requirement to read from cover to cover.

The figures throughout this book contain fictional account and finance information. (We decided it wouldn't be wise to give out information about our personal finances in print.)

Although we essentially cover accounting as it relates to using Home Accountz in this book, we put the information together in a way that hopefully allows you to understand the subject matter easily, without using a lot of confusing terminology. If you need to know a particular term to understand a concept, we explain that term and how it relates to using Home Accountz, but we don't swamp you with jargon.

Conventions Used in This Book

Although we do talk about the foreign currency features of Home Accountz, this book focuses on U.K. currency (pounds sterling). Where we use British pounds, you can use other currency, such as U.S. dollars or Euros, in nearly the same way. If we address a feature of Home Accountz that differs in other countries, we highlight this difference.

The Home Accountz software is available for PC, Mac, and Linux computers, and the actual interface for the program is the same across all three platforms. Most of the figures in this book use Mac OS X, but the principals apply equally to each platform.

Home Accountz For Dummies offers many step-by-step guides, so if you don't already own Home Accountz, we recommend downloading the current trial from www.accountz.com/dummies so that you can follow along. This special 90-day trial allows you to make the most of the book, get a taste of the functionality available and (by inputting a code) turn your trial version into an unrestricted copy.


