This case book is a collection of poverty alleviation cases in China, cross-referencing with cases overseas.

Through analysing the different strategies carried out to address the key specific pain-points at the focal regions and villages, via the effort and collaboration of key stakeholders, the book provides an overview of how Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) by the United Nations could be achieved. While 'No Poverty' is the first goal in the SDGs, the innovative poverty alleviation approaches demonstrated in these cases had tackled more than just one single goal—with solutions towards multiple dimensions of environmental or social issues.
