

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DOMINA R

MARQUIS: When and how did you decide to become a dominatrix?

Domina R: That was about twelve years ago, in my early 20s. My career started in an SM bar in Roppongi. There are mistresses and sub-girls and BDSM shows. I was so moved when I saw the show for the first time because I realized how deep and complex BDSM is. The relationship between dom and sub, radically sensual fashion, technology (especially shibari) and the eyes of the customers who soak up every detail of the show ... Everything was new and exciting for me.

MQ: Can you remember any details?

DR: The dom strangled the sub-girl with a rope, that triggered me very strongly, that awakened strong feelings that were hidden in my head for a long time and suddenly broke through! In the early days of my career as a dominatrix, I spent many days practicing shibari. When I tie someone up, I can connect deeply with them and share my complex feelings in my head without words. The words sometimes interrupt us when we try to express our conflicting feelings.

MQ: Many people consider sex work to be unethical. How do you answer that?

DR: I don't disturb anyone's well-being. I find it strange that a person is judged by his profession. But the question does involve a certain complexity. First of all, sex work would have to be defined precisely. I see myself as a sex worker, but I don't have sex with my clients. For me, it's about a dom/sub relationship. And it's about respect, that's my way. That's why I don't understand why voluntary sex work is considered unethical. It becomes unethical when someone exercises coercion, but that generally affects the most basic human rights. If someone wants to ban sex work in order to save sex workers, then that is essentially unethical.

MQ: For you, latex seems to be more than just a dominatrix's work clothes, doesn't it?

DR: At some point, I stumbled upon the term "SkinTwo," and I knew there was no better way to explain the feeling in latex. For me, it feels like all internal organs turn outwards when I dress in latex. That sounds strange, doesn't it?

MQ: Maybe a little, but I have to smile.

DR: I always become as sensitive to all stimuli as touch. Latex can make me feel more naked

than if I were naked. I'm not naked, but I'm exciting and sensual. And latex is also handy for some BDSM games, bondage and breath-play for example. And, of course, it looks great and you yourself look great when you wear it. It shines, is soft, tight. It transforms you! You can inflate it or use it with vacuum, it's perfect! You know what I mean, don't you?

MQ: Yes, I know what you mean!

DR: In short, latex is the best partner in my BDSM life.

MQ: I met you at Department H Rubber Ball as part of a group. What is it all about?

DR: The Gomrangers. We run a rubber parlour at the Department H events and help rubber fetishists network. We also do our own small events from time to time. So, if you come to Tokyo, stop by us!

MQ: Dear Domina R, thank you very much for the nice conversation, and I hope we will see each other again soon!
